Grand jury: Vet Services Office needs more help

The Calaveras County Veteran Services Office could use additional staffing to increase and upgrade its assistance to the county's 4,000-plus veterans, the 2022-2023 Calaveras County Civil Grand Jury has recommended in its latest report entitled "Veteran Services Office - No Veteran Left Behind.'

"In the process of reviewing previous Grand Jury recommendations, the 2022-2023 Calaveras County (Civil) Grand Jury has identified improvement opportunities for the Calaveras County Veteran Services Office," said the summary of the report released Thursday. "With the resources allocated, (Calaveras County Veteran Services Office) staff provides a high level of service to each veteran encountered. Past issues with consistent staffing and organizational changes have improved recently. However, the Grand Jury was able to identify areas that would help increase and upgrade service. With over 4000 veterans in the county and a small staff in (the Calaveras County Veteran Services Office), any turnover in office staff will affect the quality and quantity of service to veterans. Succession planning and an increase in support staff would help provide consistent LLC, or Cal-Waste, recently opposed a operations in times of staff turnover, move by the county to spend \$9.6 million vacations, or absences due to required






Leslie grew up here in Modesto. She attended MJC for two years and then transferred out of state to earn a B.A. & M.A. in English literature at Clemson University. She returned to Modesto in 1991 to raise her kids near her family when her husband was offered a position on MJC's English faculty. Leslie actively supported improving education in our community through volunteer roles at local, regional, and state levels, while occasionally teaching part-time.

It's because of her respect and love for MJC that she decided to run for the Board of Trustees in 2016, when she started to see clear indications that MJC's leadership was trying to stifle free speech rather than embrace it — for example, making national headlines for stopping a student from handing out U.S. Constitutions on Constitution Day in 2013.

College trustees serve in nonpartisan positions and are accountable to the community at large, and so her focus has and will remain on student learning — rooted in the free and open exchange of ideas — and strong fiscal stewardship.

When the <u>American Revolution</u> broke out in 1775, the colonists weren't fighting united under a single flag. Instead, most regiments participating in the war for independence against the British fought under their own flags. In June of 1775, the <u>Second Continental Congress</u> met in Philadelphia to create the Continental Army—a unified colonial fighting force—with the hopes of a more organized battle against its colonial oppressors. This led to the creation of what was, essentially, the first "American" flag, the Continental Colors.

For some, this flag, which was comprised of 13 red and white alternating stripes and a Union Jack in the corner, was too similar to that of the British. <u>George</u> <u>Washington</u> soon realized that flying a flag that was even remotely close to the British flag was not a great confidence-builder for the revolutionary effort, so h<u>e</u> <u>turned his efforts towards creating a new symbol of freedom</u> for the soon-to-be fledgling nation.

On June 14, 1777, the Second Continental Congress took a break from writing the <u>Articles of Confederation</u> and passed a resolution stating that "the flag of the United States be 13 stripes, alternate red and white," and that "the union be 13 stars, white in a blue field, representing a new constellation."

Over 100 years later, in 1916, <u>President Woodrow Wilson marked the anniversary of</u> <u>that decree</u> by officially establishing June 14 as Flag Day.
