OPPOSED

AB 1231 Criminal procedure: Safer Communities Through Opportunities Act

California's proposed legislation, AB 1231, seeks to introduce substantial alterations to felony sentencing processes by expanding diversion eligibility for a wide range of felony offenses. However, critics argue that this broad approach lacks a clear and commensurate benefit to public safety. The bill establishes a new felony diversion program, allowing individuals accused of various felonies—including hate crimes, looting, and repeat theft and drug offenses—to qualify for diversion away from sentencing.

Opponents of AB 1231, including the California Police Chiefs Association (CPCA), the Peace Officers Research Association of California (PORAC), the California State Sheriffs' Association (CSSA), and the Chief Probation Officers of California (CPOC), express concerns that the legislation permits felony offenders to evade significant consequences for their actions. This concern is underscored by the recent passage of Proposition 36, which aimed to strengthen penalties for some of the very offenses that AB 1231 proposes to divert from sentencing. Even after amendments made on September 8, 2025, these organizations continue to oppose the bill. **Current Status: Ordered 3rd reading**

SB 577: Eliminates Civil Protections for Child Sexual Assault Victims

SB 577, if enacted, could significantly undermine the protections for victims established by the Justice for Survivors Act (AB 452, 2023 - Addis). This legislation has the potential to reverse many of the advancements made over the years for survivors of childhood sexual assault. Key concerns include the prioritization of the financial interests of public entities at the expense of justice and the erosion of survivors' rights to pursue accountability. Specific issues associated with this bill include the removal of treble damages for instances of public entity cover-ups, an increased burden of proof for victims over the age of 40, and strict limitations on the refiling of previously dismissed cases. **Current Status: Ordered to the inactive file.**This bill is a two-year bill; it will be brought back in January 2026. We need to keep this on our radar.

SB 7 (McNerney; D-Pleasanton) Restricts Use of Automated Decision Systems in Employment: Imposes impractical requirements on employers of every size related to automated decision systems, which will discourage the use of such tools and subject employers to costly litigation and onerous new compliance procedures, thereby driving up costs and ultimately impacting consumer prices. Current Status: Hearing 9/12/2025

<u>SB 259 (Wahab; D-Hayward)</u> Online Pricing: Prohibits businesses from using any input data to create prices or discounts. Forces companies to overhaul their pricing models and strategies at significant cost, to the detriment of both the businesses themselves and their consumers. This threatens not only the profitability of businesses but also potentially reduces the availability of discounts and personalized deals for consumers. **Current Statures** Supported **9.70**.

tus: Suspended 9/9

SB 318 (Becker; D-Menlo Park) Air Quality Governance: Imposes extensive new mandates and permitting requirements that introduce significant regulatory uncertainty, force costly technology upgrades on stationary sources, and increase the cost of operating in California for critical sectors such as energy, food production, manufacturing, and recycling. Such costs undermine the state's competitiveness and further strain affordability for residents. Held in Senate Appropriations.

<u>SB 384 (Wahab; D-Hayward)</u> Prohibition on Using Information to Set Competitive Pricing: Effectively banning the use of technology to help set prices or help manage supply levels. Will make it harder for businesses to offer discounts and competitive pricing to their customers. Held in Assembly

5 Facts About Veterans Day

It honors all U.S. veterans. This holiday celebrates men and women who have served in the U.S. armed forces, both living and deceased, across all eras and conflicts.

It was originally Armistice Day. The holiday's original name, Armistice Day, was established in 1919 to mark the anniversary of the armistice that ended WWI on November 11, 1918.

The name changed to Veterans Day in 1954 by President Eisenhower.

The holiday is recognized internationally. Other countries that were allies in WWI such as Canada, Australia, and Great Britain, also commemorate their veterans around November 11th.

The military men and women who serve and protect the United States come from all walks of life; they are parents, children, grandparents, friends, neighbors and coworkers, and are an important part of their communities.

Here are some facts about the veteran population of the United States:

- During the 2022 midterm elections, around a fifth (21 percent) of the candidates for U.S. Senate, U.S. House or governor claimed some degree of military experience.
- 10 percent of living veterans are women.
- 5.9 million veterans served during the Vietnam War.
- 7.8 million veterans served in the Gulf War era.
- 933,000 veterans served during the Korean War.
- Of the 16 million Americans who served during World War II, about 119,550 were still alive as of 2023.

ELECTION RIGGING RESPONSE ACT/PROPOSITION 50 (2025)

Special Election on November 4, 2025

Why Happening: Strategic response after Texas redrew maps that will affect both its State Legislative and U.S. Congressional Districts.


What Prop. 50 Does: Alters redistricting system. Temporary pause that lets the State Legislature redraw maps for elections through 2030. Automatic return to the Commission after 2030. (2031)

Strategic plan with a revised redistricting map is to add more registered Democratic voters to districts held by Republicans or reduce splits across cities and counties. Redrawing of the maps makes these districts more favora-

ble to Democrats.

Primary Goal: Target 5 Republican held districts to flip Democrat. The 5 targeted districts and the most effected by the redistricting maps. These areas see the biggest political shifts - could flip Republican seats.

- CA-01 Loses Republican leaning areas near Oregon border and gains Democratic areas around Santa Rosa. (Northern CA)
- CA-03 Sheds Eastern Sierra (Republican areas). Gains areas closer to Sacramento-lean Democratic.
- CA-22 Picks up more of Fresno County's Democratic leaning areas while trimming some Republican leaning parts. Impact: Central Valley farming communities may see their districts tilt more toward city-based voters.





Democratic (D+10% to D+100%)

CA-41 Moves from swing area in western Inland Empire (large region in Southern Ca east of LA). Includes Riverside and San Bernardino) to more Democrat leaning zones in LA County. Impact: One of the State's longest-serving Republicans could now be in a much more difficult district.

CA-48 Removes some Republican areas in San Diego County; adds Democrat-leaning regions around Coachella Valley. Impact: San Diego area conservatives lose ground, while more diverse inland communities gain voice.

Costs: Counties would have to cover most of the costs. Involved in those costs are ballot changes, voter materials, and adjusting systems. It is going to cost millions of dollars with only approximately \$200,000 coming directly from the State budget.



Why It Matters: Prop. 50 tweaks key areas to reshape a handful of competing districts. This targeted approach highlights how adjustments by just shifting a few communities can reshape electoral dynamics for years.

If Proposition 50 passes, our representation as Republicans will diminish for years to come in California.
